

## 2008 Riverbend Certamen

### LEVEL IA - ROUND 1

**Note to Moderator:** Teams are to confer quietly and write down the answers to questions 1-5. When time is called, have the all the captains of each team show their written answers at the same time. Every team will score points for a correct answer and will have the opportunity to answer the bonus question for bonus points.

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- 1) WRITE-DOWN: Winter is a time of fun and excitement, especially if the weather cooperates. Well, around the Fredericksburg area, Old Man Winter has been absent without leave for several years now and folks want to see some snow. Using the third conjugation verb *ningo, ningere*, say in Latin, “Will it snow tomorrow?”     NINGETNE CRAS  
BONUS: Maybe Old Man Winter is not the one to pester -- Mother Nature may be the one to ask. Write in Latin, “Snow, Mother Nature!”     NINGE, MATER NATURA!
  
- 2) WRITE-DOWN: A Roman *patronus* would be greeted by several of his *clientes* in the morning. What was this meeting called in Latin?     SALUTATIO  
BONUS: A *patronus* would often give a small gift to those *clientes* who greeted him. What is the Latin term for this gift?     SPORTULA
  
- 3) WRITE-DOWN: Who was the first Roman emperor?     AUGUSTUS/OCTAVIAN  
BONUS: Who was the last Roman emperor?     ROMULUS AUGUSTULUS
  
- 4) WRITE-DOWN: What Roman god was charged with conducting the souls of the dead to the Underworld?     MERCURIUS/MERCURY  
BONUS: What was the name of the ferryman who shuttled the dead across the River Styx?     CHARON

**Note to Moderator:** Question 5 is a visual question. Show the picture and read the accompanying question. All teams should write their answers as in questions 1-4.

- 5) WRITE-DOWN: Identify the deity in the picture.     DIANA/ARTEMIS  
BONUS: According to Greek myth, who were this goddess’ parents?     ZEUS AND LETO

**Note to Moderator:** Teams should slap in to answer questions 6-20. Operate under “normal” certamen rules and procedures.

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- 6) TOSS-UP: Where would an ancient Roman typically wear *soleae* and *calcei*?  
ON HIS FEET

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BONUS: Where would an ancient Roman typically wear a *pilleus* and *petasus*?

ON HIS HEAD

7) TOSS-UP: One of the Emperor Augustus' favorite Latin mottoes was *fentina lente*. What does that mean?

MAKE HASTE SLOWLY

BONUS: If someone chose not to make haste slowly, he might find himself between a rock and a hard place. What mythological phrase illustrates this modern maxim?

BETWEEN SCYLLA AND CHARYBDIS

8) TOSS-UP: What is the first person singular, pluperfect active indicative of the Latin verb from which we get the English word "audition"?

AUDIVERAM

BONUS: What is the first person plural, future perfect active indicative of the Latin verb from which we get the English word "trade"?

TRADIDERO

9) TOSS-UP: What animal proved to be a capable watch-dog and alerted Manlius Capitolinus that the Gauls were scaling the Capitoline Hill one night?

GEESE

BONUS: What treacherous Roman girl gave her name to the cliff on the Palatine Hill from which traitors and other undesirables would be thrown to their deaths?

TARPEIA

10) TOSS-UP: What region of Italy is probably named after the Latin word for "wide" or "spacious"?

LATIUM/LAZIO

BONUS: What region of Italy is named from the Latin meaning "the land of shadow"?

UMBRIA

11) TOSS-UP: The Olympic Games were held every four years in honor of the god Zeus. The games became so important that they were used to mark the passing of time. What were these four-year intervals called?

OLYMPIADS

BONUS: In what year were the ancient Olympic Games founded?

776 BC

12) TOSS-UP: On Christmas Day, Pope Benedict gave his annual message "*urbi et orbi*". In what case are these common Latin nouns?

DATIVE

BONUS: What does *urbi et orbi* mean?

TO THE CITY AND TO THE WORLD

13) TOSS-UP: What Trojan abducted Helen, the most beautiful woman in the world?

PARIS

BONUS: What Greek had first abducted Helen when she was young?

THESEUS (accept PIRITHOUS)

14) TOSS-UP: What Roman general was the first to lead an army into Britain?

JULIUS CAESAR

BONUS: Which Roman emperor commanded that troops be sent to Britain in order to gather sea-shells on the beach?

GAIUS/CALIGULA

15) TOSS-UP: What type of toga was worn by young children and Roman magistrates?

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### TOGA PRAETEXTA

BONUS: What type of toga was worn by men seeking to be elected to office?

TOGA CANDIDA

16) TOSS-UP: What Roman poet wrote the *Aeneid*, an epic poem depicting the adventures of Aeneas as he leads his refugees from the sack of Troy to Italy?

(PUBLIUS) VERGIL(IUS) (MARO)

BONUS: What Roman author described in a letter the eruption of Mt. Vesuvius and the death of his uncle there?

PLINY THE YOUNGER/GAIUS PLINIUS SECUNDUS

17) TOSS-UP: What mythological creature was half-man, half-goat and usually had the tail of a horse?

SATYR

BONUS: Who was Bacchus' drunken attendant whom some writes describe as a satyr?

SILENUS

18) TOSS-UP: Responde Latine: Would a Roman wear *soleae in capite, in pedibus, or in manibus*?

IN PEDIBUS

BONUS: Responde Latine: Would a Roman wear an *anulus in digito, in oculo, or in genu*?

IN DIGITO

19) TOSS-UP: Welcome to Mathematica Latina! Responde Latine. Quot sunt octo et duodecim?

VIGINTI

BONUS: Responde Latine. Quot sunt decim et viginti?

TRIGINTA

20) TOSS-UP: Welcome to the Cinema Romana! What movie would the Romans have called *Novus in Oppido*?

NEW IN TOWN

BONUS: What about the upcoming flick *Panthera Punicea Secunda*?

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### LEVEL IA - ROUND 2

**Note to Moderator:** Teams are to confer quietly and write down the answers to questions 1-5. When time is called, have the all the captains of each team show their written answers at the same time. Every team will score points for a correct answer and will have the opportunity to answer the bonus question for bonus points.

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1) WRITE-DOWN: Many Latin teachers are members of the American Classical League. The ACL's motto is *Vestra Causa Tota Nostra Est*. What is the English translation for this motto?

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YOUR CAUSE IS OUR WHOLE (CAUSE) (or similar)

BONUS: Many Latin students are members of the Junior Classical League, whose theme this year, attributed to Aesop, is *Fortuna Nobis Vi Animi Tantum Frenabitur*. What is the English translation for this sententia? THE LEVEL OF OUR SUCCESS IS LIMITED ONLY BY OUR IMAGINATION

2) WRITE-DOWN: At a Roman wedding, what was the *flammeum*?

THE BRIDE'S VEIL

BONUS: The *flammeum* was so named because it was orange, or flame-colored. What was the *flammeum* this bright color? TO WARD OFF EVIL SPIRITS/BAD LUCK/ETC.

3) WRITE-DOWN: Roman history gives us some great allusions. What English phrase is used to describe a victory won at such a great cost that another such victory would be impossible?

PYRRHIC VICTORY

BONUS: What historical allusion is used mean wasting time on unimportant or self-indulgent matters during a time of crisis? TO FIDDLE WHILE ROME BURNS

4) WRITE-DOWN: Theseus was the forgetful sort. His own father flung himself off a cliff when Theseus forgot to replace the black sail on his ship with a white one when returning from killing the Minotaur. What was his father's name? AEGEUS

BONUS: On the same trip, Theseus forgot about his girlfriend and left her behind on an island when he departed. What was the name of Theseus' lovely assistant who helped him kill the Minotaur? ARIADNE

**Note to Moderator:** Question 5 is a visual question. Show the picture and read the accompanying question. All teams should write their answers as in questions 1-4.

5) WRITE-DOWN: Identify this room of the Roman house. PERISTYLIUM

BONUS: What is the Latin term for the garden contained in this room? HORTUS

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6) WRITE-DOWN: What is the Latin term for the male head of the Roman family?

PATERFAMILIAS

BONUS: What is the Latin term for the power he held over his family?

PATRIAPOTESTAS

7) WRITE-DOWN: Many Roman monuments and even signs and sewer covers in Rome today carry the abbreviation S.P.Q.R. What is the English meaning for this abbreviation?

THE SENATE AND THE PEOPLE OF ROME

BONUS: What is the Latin for this abbreviation? SENATUS POPULUSQUE ROMANUS

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- 8) TOSS-UP: Change the verb *agebant* to the perfect tense. EGERUNT  
BONUS: Change *egerunt* to the future perfect tense. EGERINT
- 9) TOSS-UP: What Roman slave, trained as a gladiator near Capua, led a slave revolt which terrified the Romans? SPARTACUS  
BONUS: What Roman general marched in at the last battle which saw the end of the revolt and claimed the credit for defeating Spartacus? (GNAEUS) POMPEY (THE GREAT)
- 10) TOSS-UP: Who were the first two Roman consuls of the Roman Republic? BRUTUS AND COLLATINUS  
BONUS: What oracle told them that the next ruler of Rome would be the first to kiss their mother? (APOLLO'S ORACLE AT) DELPHI
- 11) TOSS-UP: Question #11 is a Rhyme Time question. The answer must be a two-word, rhyming phrase. Here goes: The Roman who conquered Gaul is said to have had his body hair plucked. What would he have used? CAESAR'S TWEEZERS  
BONUS: The bonus question is also a Rhyme Time question. The "fiddling" emperor who had his meddling mother put to death delegated the task to these trustworthy and courageous folks. NERO'S HEROES
- 12) TOSS-UP: What boy persuaded his father Apollo to allow him to drive the chariot of the sun, a ride which ended in disaster? PHAETHON  
BONUS: One of Apollo's duties was his driving of the chariot of the sun across the heavens every day. What epithet is used to describe Apollo as "bright" or "shining"? PHOEBUS
- 13) TOSS-UP: What Roman praenomen was abbreviated C.? GAIUS  
BONUS: What Roman praenomen was abbreviated Cn.? GNAEUS
- 14) TOSS-UP: At what battle did the forces of Octavian defeat the forces of Antony and Cleopatra? ACTIUM  
BONUS: In what year did this battle take place? 31 BC
- 15) TOSS-UP: Why mythological pair's ill-fated love for each other was responsible for turning the mulberry red? PYRAMUS AND THISBE  
BONUS: The story of Pyramus and Thisbe took place in the Middle East. What fabled city provided the backdrop for this myth? BABYLON
- 16) TOSS-UP: What was the original Latin name for the Italian city of Naples? NEAPOLIS  
BONUS: What modern city in Italy was originally called Mediolanum? MILAN/MILANO
- 17) TOSS-UP: Who freed Athens from an annual tribute of youth and maidens who were sent Crete to feed the Minotaur? THESEUS  
BONUS: What beautiful Cretan maiden aided Theseus in his quest and then fell with him?

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### ARIADNE/ARIADNA

- 18) TOSS-UP: Whose temple in the Roman Forum was circular and housed the sacred flame of Rome? VESTA  
BONUS: Whose temple in the Roman Forum was built on the spot where he was cremated? JULIUS CAESAR
- 19) TOSS-UP: How old is a septuagenarian? IN HIS SEVENTIES or AT LEAST 70  
BONUS: From your knowledge of Latin numbers, what is the term for someone in his or her nineties? NONAGENARIAN
- 20) TOSS-UP: You stayed for a double-feature at the Cinema Romana! What movie would the Romans have called *Ego et Marleus*? MARLEY AND ME  
BONUS: What about *Taurinus Magnus*? GRAN TORINO

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### LEVEL IA - ROUND 3

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- 1) WRITE-DOWN: Sometimes people get it and sometimes people have to be led by the nose to understand. What is the meaning of the Latin phrase *verbum sapienti sat est*?

- 2) WRITE-DOWN: What was the Latin term for the slave who accompanied a Roman child to school and tutored him in his studies? PAEDAGOGUS  
BONUS: What is the Latin term for the equivalent of a secondary school teacher? GRAMMATICUS
- 3) TOSS-UP: What powerful Latin city was supposedly founded by Aeneas’ son Ascanius? It was probably located on a ridge overlooking a large lake. ALBA LONGA  
BONUS: What king of Alba Longa was responsible for the imprisonment of Rhea Silvia and ordered her twin boys to be thrown into the Tiber River? AMULIUS

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4) WRITE-DOWN: What beautiful young maiden became the wife of Cupid after he was sent by his mother Venus, offended by her beauty, to cause her to fall in love with an unattractive husband?  
PSYCHE

BONUS: What was the Roman name for the young maiden who was snatched away by Pluto to become his wife?  
PROSERPINA

**Note to Moderator:** Question 5 is a visual question. Show the picture and read the accompanying question. All teams should write their answers as in questions 1-4.

5) WRITE-DOWN: Identify the Roman hero standing on the left of this picture.

CINCINNATUS

BONUS: Against what foe was Cincinnatus being called to fight? AEQUIANS

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6) TOSS-UP: 5,000; 10,000; 25,000; or 50,000... Which number is closest to the actual capacity of the Flavian Amphitheater, commonly known as the Colosseum? 50,000

BONUS: 100,000; 250,000; or 500,000... Which number is closest to the actual capacity of the Circus Maximus? 250,000

7) TOSS-UP: What Latin phrase is used to as a way to say “my fault” or “my bad”?

MEA CULPA

BONUS: What Latin phrase is used to describe an attack on the individual rather than discussing or debating the issues? AD HOMINEM

8) TOSS-UP: What is the Latin phrase for “in wine there is truth”? IN VINO VERITAS

BONUS: What is the Latin phrase which is the equivalent of the English “from soup to nuts”? AB OVO USQUE AD MALA

9) TOSS-UP: What son of Priam was the greatest warrior for the Trojans in the Trojan War?

HECTOR

BONUS: Who, the greatest warrior for the Greeks, killed Hector and then dragged his body three times around the walls of Troy, to horror of the Greeks, Trojans, and even the gods?

ACHILLES

10) TOSS-UP: Which Roman emperor took advantage of a great fire in Rome to build a huge, golden palace for himself near the Roman Forum? NERO

BONUS: What was the Latin name for this huge, golden palace? DOMUS AUREA

11) TOSS-UP: Aren't verbs with irregular principal parts fun? What are the principal parts for the verb “to be able”? POSSUM, POSSE, POTUI, -----

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BONUS: What are the principal parts of the verb *do*, meaning “to give”?  
DO, DARE, DEDI, DATUM

12) TOSS-UP: What is the meaning of the Latin preposition *propter*?  
BECAUSE OF/ON ACCOUNT OF

BONUS: What is the meaning of the Latin adverb *paene*?  
ALMOST

13) TOSS-UP: What Greek Titan was tricked by his wife into swallowing a stone instead of eating his son Zeus?  
CRONUS

BONUS: Who was Cronus’ wife?  
RHEA

14) TOSS-UP: What wealthy Roman general mounted a military campaign against the Parthians in 53 BC? He lost, was captured, and killed. (MARCUS LICINIUS) CRASSUS

BONUS: At what battle did Crassus lose, was captured, and killed? CARRHAE

15) TOSS-UP: In a Roman house, what was the difference between the *impluvium* and the *compluvium*?  
IMPLUVIUM = POOL INTO WHICH RAINWATER COLLECTED and  
COMPLUVIUM = OPENING IN CEILING OF ATRIUM THROUGH WHICH RAIN FELL

BONUS: What room in the Roman house was named literally “columns all around”?  
PERISTYLIUM

16) TOSS-UP: If your Latin teacher says “*Tacete omnes*”, what is she saying?  
ASKING EVERYONE TO BE QUIET

BONUS: If your Latin teacher tells you “*Deponite libros*”, what is he asking you do?  
PUT AWAY YOUR BOOKS

17) TOSS-UP: What mythological phrase refers to one’s weakness or vulnerability?  
ACHILLES’ HEEL

BONUS: What mythological term refers to a long and adventurous journey?  
ODYSSEY

18) TOSS-UP: Almost everyone who lived in ancient Rome wore a tunic. From what material were most tunics made?  
WOOL

BONUS: What is the Latin word for a loincloth or our equivalent of underwear?  
SUBLIGACULUM/SUBLIGAR

19) TOSS-UP: If you were setting sail from Athens’ port Piraeus, into which sea would you be dipping your oars?  
AEGEAN

BONUS: What island serves as the southern boundary of the Aegean Sea? CRETE

20) TOSS-UP: Welcome back to the Cinema Romana! What movie would the Romans have called *Caupona Canibus*?  
HOTEL FOR DOGS

BONUS: What about *Bella Inter Nuptas*?  
BRIDE WARS

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### LEVEL IA - ROUND 4

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- 1) WRITE-DOWN: "Latin is a language, as dead as dead can be..." We've all heard this nonsense from those who just don't understand. Using the Latin word *lingua, linguae* for language, say in Latin, "We will always love the Latin language."

(NOS) SEMPER AMABIMUS LINGUAM LATINAM

BONUS: Now say in Latin, "We can never have enough of the Latin language."

(NOS) NUMQUAM POSSUMUS HABERE SATIS (LINGVAE) LATINAE

- 2) WRITE-DOWN: Evidence points to the Romans adopting a seven-day week in the 4th century AD. At some point they even began to name their days. What is the Latin for "Saturday"?

DIES SATURNI

BONUS: What day of the week would be *Dies Lunae*? MONDAY

- 3) WRITE-DOWN: List the Julio-Claudian Emperors in the order in which they ruled.

AUGUSTUS, TIBERIUS, GAIUS/CALIGULA, CLAUDIUS, NERO

BONUS: List the Flavian Emperors in the order in which they ruled.

VERSPASIAN, TITUS, DOMITIAN

- 4) WRITE-DOWN: How about some more mythological allusions? Someone who is successful at everything he attempts is said to have his touch.

MIDAS

BONUS: What mythological allusion is used to represent something that is better avoided, lest by going there, or opening that box, we bring more troubles upon ourselves than we are able to handle.

A PANDORA'S BOX

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6) TOSS-UP: What is the Latin word for the bundle of rods surrounding an ax? It represented a symbol of authority for various magistrates. FASCES  
BONUS: What were the bearers of the fasces called? LICTORS/LICTORES

7) TOSS-UP: What Latin phrase containing a “Q” word is used to show a reciprocal agreement, such as, “I scratch your back, you scratch mine”? QUID PRO QUO  
BONUS: What Latin phrase containing a “Q” word is used to describe something that is a requirement or an absolute necessity? SINE QUA NON

8) TOSS-UP: Did Mt. Vesuvius erupt and destroy Pompeii during the Roman Monarchy, Republic, or Empire? EMPIRE  
BONUS: Who was the Roman emperor when Pompeii was destroyed? TITUS

9) TOSS-UP: What latin phrase describes the period of peace and prosperity brought to the Mediterranean world by the stability and protection of the early Roman empire?  
PAX ROMANA  
BONUS: What is the Latin for the phrase “Peace be with you”? PAX VOBISCUM/  
PAX TECUM

10) TOSS-UP: Who was the last king of Rome? TARQUINIUS SUPERBUS  
BONUS: What does Superbus mean in English? ARROGANT/HAUGHTY/PROUD

11) TOSS-UP: What is the Latin for the state motto of Kansas: “to the stars through difficulties”?  
AD ASTRA PER ASPERA  
BONUS: What is the meaning of Wyoming’s motto, *Arma cedant togae*?  
LET/MAY ARMS YIELD TO THE TOGA

12) TOSS-UP: What was the name of the first ship which Jason used to fetch the golden fleece?  
ARGO  
BONUS: In Greek mythology, there are several different people or things named Argus. Identify two of them.  
THE BUILDER OF THE ARGO, THE  
CREATURE WITH COUNTLESS EYES USED  
AS A GUARD, ODYSSEUS’ DOG, FOUNDER  
OF THE CITY OF ARGOS, PERSON RESCUED  
BY THE ARGONAUTS

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- 13) TOSS-UP: Rome gained control of three large islands after the Punic Wars. Today, Sicily and Sardinia still belong to Italy, but what country possesses Corsica? FRANCE  
BONUS: What island once sacred to Venus is claimed today by both Greece and Turkey? CYPRUS
- 14) TOSS-UP: Which Roman king had been born as a slave? SERVIUS TULLIUS  
BONUS: Which Roman king founded many of Rome's early religious rituals? NUMA POMPILIUS
- 15) TOSS-UP: It has been said that the use of Roman numerals in the Roman Empire set back the development of higher-order mathematics by centuries because they were so clumsy to work with. Add these Roman numerals and give your answer in Roman numerals: XLIII + LXXIV = ? CXVII  
BONUS: OK, math whizzes, try this one: CDL + MVI = ? MCDLVI
- 16) TOSS-UP: Using the dative case, say in Latin, "I have a name." MIHI NOMEN EST  
BONUS: Using an impersonal verb, ask, "Is it permitted for me to go?" LICETNE MIHI IRE
- 17) TOSS-UP: Who is the Roman goddess of the hunt and the moon? DIANA  
BONUS: Whom did Diana turn into a stag to be torn up by his own hounds just because he saw her naked in the woods? ACTAEON
- 18) TOSS-UP: What term did the Romans use for "dinner"? CENA  
BONUS: What was the term the Romans used for "breakfast"? ENTACULUM
- 19) TOSS-UP: In one of his more famous speeches the orator Cicero shouted out *O tempora! O mores!* What does this mean in English? OH THE TIMES! OH THE CUSTOMS!  
BONUS: What use of the accusative case is demonstrated by *tempora* and *mores* in this phrase? EXCLAMATION
- 20) TOSS-UP: Welcome back to our final visit to the Cinema Romana! What movie would the Romans have called *In Tribus Modis Meus Valentinus Sanguineus*?  
MY BLOODY VALENTINE 3-D  
BONUS: What about the upcoming flick *Ille Modo Non Est Tantum In Te*?  
HE'S JUST NOT THAT INTO YOU
